Dear Parent

Greetings!

We hope this note finds you well. As technology continues to evolve and become more integrated into our everyday lives, it is imperative for us to address the issue of cyber law rules and guidelines. We understand that as parents, you play a critical role in ensuring your child's safety and promoting responsible digital citizenship. Therefore, we would like to provide you with an overview of cyber law rules, to help you understand the legal framework surrounding digital interactions.

These laws are designed to protect individuals in the digital realm, establish guidelines for proper online conduct, and prevent or address cybercrimes. It is crucial for us to educate our children about these rules, as they navigate the expansive virtual world.

### **The 'IT ACT 2000' introduced certain sections which state as follows:-**

- **SEC 66 C** - Whoever, fraudulently or dishonestly make use of the electronic signature, password or any other unique identification feature of any other person, shall be punished with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to three years and shall also be liable to fine which may extend to rupees one lakh.
- **SEC 67 & SEC 67 A**- Whoever publishes or transmits or causes to be published or transmit any material which is lascivious or appeals to the prurient shall be punished on first conviction with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to three years and with fine which may extend to five lakh rupees and in the event of second or subsequent conviction with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to five years and also with fine which may extend to ten lakh rupees.
- **SEC 67 B** - Publishes or transmits or causes to be published or transmitted material in any electronic form which depicts children engaged in sexually explicit act or conduct. The person shall be punished on first conviction with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to five years and with fine which may extend to ten lakh rupees and in the event of second or subsequent conviction with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to seven years and also with fine which may extend to ten lakh rupees.

- **SEC 66** - If any person, dishonestly or fraudulently without the permission of owner or any other person-in-charge damage the computer, or Computer System, or Computer Network, he shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three years or with fine which may extend to five lakh rupees or with both.
- **SEC 66 E**- Whoever, intentionally or knowingly captures, publishes or transmits the image of a private area of any person without his or her consent, under circumstances violating the privacy of that person, shall be punished with imprisonment which may extend to three years or with fine not exceeding two lakh rupees, or with both.
- **SEC 66 A**- Any electronic mail or electronic mail message for the purpose of causing annoyance or inconvenience or to deceive or to mislead the addressee or recipient about the origin of such messages, shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three years with fine.

We believe that educating our children about cyber law rules is a collective effort, and your involvement as parents is crucial. Together, we can equip them with the knowledge and skills necessary to navigate the digital landscape responsibly and ethically.
